Farm and Bureau Home and Safety

The Waseca County Farm Bureau's Farm and Home Safety Days took place during an overcast Tuesday, Sept. 9 at the Waseca fairgrounds. The day featured volunteers demonstrating safe procedures for things around the farm and home including chemical, electrical, animal, chainsaw and lawnmower safety, ATVs, snowmobiles and tractors. What started out as a roam-the-fairgrounds sort of morning turned into an inside day because the rain started a little after noon, forcing the still cheerful and full-of-energy fifth-graders inside the giant fair buildings. Fifth-graders from around the region came through during different time slots: in attendance across the day were young students from Waterville-Elysian-Morristown, Waseca Intermediate, TEAM Academy, Trinity Lutheran Janes-

ville and Janesville Public Schools.

Reese Boucher, employee of Crystal Valley Coop and expert volunteer was in the 4-H Barn. As groups arrived, he handed each of the students a single soybean, allowing them to experience the size, color, consistency and texture. Many accidentally let the small sample slip through their fingers and asked for a replacement. Others pulverized their bean. But that was okay because Boucher had plenty. With everyone listening, he presented three plastic bottles filled with similar color liquids, red, yellow and orange. One was anti-freeze, one was gasoline, and another was Mt. Dew. The children did a pretty good job identifying which was which. He gave students a clear warning: "You will encounter different and dangerous chemicals wherever you go every day." He

Markeson and Vought named "Friends of the Classic"

Organizers of the thirty-eighth Waseca Marching Classic this Saturday have selected Penny Vought and Kris Markeson, recently retired and current Waseca Chiefs of Police as this year's "Friends of the Classic."

The selection, organizers explain, is in gratitude for the "security and safety" Waseca police and police reserves have maintained each year for nearly four decades.

"It's nice to have our work acknowledged," stated Vought, who had been with the department for 40 years prior to stepping down late last year. "The Classic is part of who we are here in Waseca, and we're glad to help out."

Markeson observed, "We care about our community and the people who visit it, so we're glad to be part of the Classic's success every year."

"Many of our officers have or have had children in marching band, and so they especially don't mind supporting the event."

With that said, the two go on to summarize the various steps needed on the department's part as the parade approaches. "We have to be aware of the date months in advance," Markeson said, "because part of the route is on a state highway. That means we have to apply with the state to have the road closed. That has to be approved and we have to get verification back."

About a month beforehand, all city police officers and reserve members are notified they will be working during the parade; a presence of nearly 25 representatives is created. Most are assigned to maintain order and manage any traffic problems at 20 or more intersections along the route. A lead car is placed at the front of the parade lineup to define the route and to call in assistance if any is needed.

The department is not in charge of putting up signs, but does confirm the signs are doing a good job of guiding drivers as they try to navigate closed streets. Any cars parked along the parade route are dealt with, "We try to find the owners and

get them to move the cars," said Markeson. "But we have the authority to have them towed if we need to."

A role many officers enjoy, Markeson said, is that of "a walking, talking information booth," able either to answer people's questions or to help them find the source for those answers.

Speaking of questions, Markeson says the route map for the parade is posted on the police department Facebook page. He mentions the best place for audience members to position themselves is along State Street downtown, since that is where the bands perform their rou-

tines.
"It's a busy day for everybody," Vought mentions. "We have the extra traffic in town, the closed streets, and the two different events—the parade downtown and the field show at the high school football field. Many people are going in many directions all day long."

A big difference this year, Markeson points out, is that the usual traffic detour, Second Street Northwest, is closed by construction. "We have a new route figured out," he says, "and we'll help people find their way."

The newly renamed Waseca Area Chamber of Commerce and Tourism (WACCT) held an open house Sept. 9 to introduce area residents to its new location and its expanded name and priorities. The new office is attached to the Suburban Furniture store on North State Street. More than 60 interested area residents attended. There were cookies, fudge, lemonade and plenty of smiling faces inside. Outside, a light rain saw more than one person running to the door trying to stay dry.

Inside, a service counter which would normally be staffed by WACCT executive assistant Kristie Biehn was instead occupied by a smiling Mikhail Rostislavovich, president of the Waseca Area Chamber of Commerce, ready to shake hands in welcome. He started the tour in the conference room saying the new space has "more room, more office space and better accessibility. We can lend the conference room to anyone who needs to talk about tourism; both it and us are always here when they need it." When asked about the organization's former location at 210 North State Street, he said it is now available to interested renters. Of the WACCT, he said, "We moved here in the early part of July and absolutely love it."

Next on the tour was the community room, which offers a dining table and extra storage space. All guests were offered refreshments and had a chance to admire photographs of local attractions hung for display. Among the modern-day photos were vintage pictures showcasing changes that have taken place to local streets and buildings, and progress that's been made and hopefully continues.

Theresa Sunde was there, Waseca Chamber Ambassador, she's the one responsible for the Waseca Chat on Facebook. In Rostislavovich's words, "So far [the Chat] has been very well attended and community oriented." She was welcomed as she started her tour.

Organization president elect Jodie Thompson was also present; Since 2018, Thompson has served as a Waseca Area Chamber Ambassador and is also an active member of the Waseca Area Chorale and the Waseca Area Lions Club. Thompson chairs the WACCT membership committee and is a member of the workforce development committee. Said Rostislavovich, "She's brought in 17 more members since January 1."

Robin Dulas, executive director for the Chamber, has more than 25 years of experience as a church administrator: "I bring expertise in financial management, organizational leadership, event planning, and effective communication. My passion for fostering connections and creating meaningful experiences extends beyond my professional role into my community involvement. NATURE NOTES

"Why do birds mob hawks and owls?" It may look as if fools are rushing in, but it's a defense mechanism. Songbirds hope predators will leave once their cover has been blown. The feathered mob uses alarm calls to attract a mixed species of birds willing to set aside their differences and confront a common enemy. Adults might demonstrate correct behavior to immature birds, and it might be an opportunity for a bird to impress potential mates.

Adventures at Six Flags: Wrath of Rakshasa

After my very enjoyable ride on an Amtrak passenger train a week ago, it wasn't long before I was taking the ride I had been looking forward to all summer.

A roller coaster named "Wrath of Rakshasa" opened at the Six Flags Great America theme park in Gurnee, Ill., in June. I had been looking for my chance to ride it ever since. Fortunately for me, my sister-in-law Joan lives only 15 minutes from the park, and has an extra bedroom she's willing to let me use. Even more fortunately, she also loves roller coasters.

There are 11 or more at Six Flags, and we've ridden them all together numerous times.

If you've ever been to a theme park, you know a large percentage of your time there is usually spent standing in line waiting for your turn. That's why it's nice to have at least one companion—so you have someone to talk with while waiting. One topic which comes up at least once each trip is trying to decide which of the many coasters are our favorites.

We never manage to choose one favorite, you see, because sometimes it is a certain feature of the ride we like, as opposed to the ride as a whole.

For example, some have "cars" (the arrangements of seats) which include a side by side bench for two and a fairly simple seat belt. Riders sit in a (very fast) carriage holding on to a grab bar with their hands while their feet are planted on the floor. Other cars harness the riders in with over-the-shoulder metal rigs and leave the riders' feet dangling in space. One ride at Six Flags, named "Superman," is even designed to mimic flying free through the air, so the riders are harnessed in seats from the buttocks upward, their legs are held in place from below, and then the whole car tips forward so everyone is facing downward.

Joan and I have been enjoying the

rides together for at least two decades, so we have seen different versions come and go. We have also noted that the rides on coasters become less smooth as their structures age.

All these elements are up for discussion as we work our way through lines which sometimes have hundreds and hundreds of people in them, leaving a great deal of time for analysis and debate. Another way to phrase it would be "anticipation."

This past weekend, we had other items on our schedule, and so planned to squeeze in only three to four hours at the park. Thus, we walked right past some of our other favorites and went straight to Wrath of Rakshasa.

At least for the time being, the ride holds two world records. Riders experience five inversions, meaning, they turn upside down five times. Near the beginning, riders are taken 171 feet in the air. Their car is sent just over the curve of a long drop and held there for a brief moment, then flies downward along a "more than vertical 96-degree drop." In other words, not just "straight down" but slightly inward. The five inversions and the 96 degrees are the records. Also impressive, though not records, are the two-minute duration and the top speed of 67 miles per hour.

Rather than having me spend any more time trying to describe the ride, let me recommend a YouTube "point of view" (POV) video taken from the front row; just search for "Ride of Rakshasa POV." Watching it gives a

strong feel for the actual experience.

Approaching the ride, one gets an impression of a gigantic maze of twists, turns and loops which builds tremendous anticipation.

So, Joan and I arrived at the park and walked straight to our objective. As we got in line, we walked past many empty switchbacks for the line, only reaching other people about halfway in. Perhaps it was because we were enjoying our conversation, but we were both surprised at how quickly the line advanced. Joan had already taken the ride three times before, and so shared some of her impressions and experiences.

For one thing, there were three cars, also known as "trains," in operation; each one holds up to 21 riders in three rows, each seven seats wide. The loading process is quite streamlined, so it takes only a few minutes to get everyone into their seats and harnessed. So at any given time, one train is loading, another is on the track for its two-minute run, and a third one is returning to the station, ready to unload its passengers and allow the next set on.

All our circumstances aligned in such a way that it was almost exactly 30 minutes from the time we walked through the entry gate to the time we were being unloaded from our completed ride. We were very pleased, having waited two hours and more for other roller coasters during their first seasons.

Knowing we had to leave the park for a few hours for a family get-together, we worked our way back to-

ward the entrance, stopping for an icy treat and to take two other rides along the way.

When the party was over, we were uncertain whether it was worth it to return to the park. By the time we would arrive, there would be only about 45 minutes before the park was due to close. We decided no, then yes, then no, then finally yes, and dashed back.

With such a short time left, I said we should ride Wrath of Rakshasa again, and so we headed to the line entry. We walked past a few more empty switchbacks than we had earlier in the day, and found ourselves seated and full of anticipation after only about 25 minutes, at which point it was about 10 minutes to closing time at 8 p.m.

As our train returned to the station for unloading, people in the car were shouting "one more time" in unison. The ride operator made a statement something like, "If you really want to go one more time, go around and get back in line. You should still have time to do it before they put the chains across the entry."

So we took him up on his suggestion. Policy at the park, you see, is that if you are in a line before closing time, you get to take your ride. We got back to the entry gate and walked on in, right past even more empty switchbacks than either of the other two times.

Thus it was that we found ourselves "closing down" the ride—that is, we were passengers on the very last train of the evening, sometime around 8:20 p.m. After a summer of anticipation, three rides in a single day seemed like a triumphant accomplishment.

Harnessed into our seats, I looked over at Joan and, remembering our back-and-forth decision only about 80 minutes before, said, "Boy, I'm sure glad we decided to come back to the park."

Mountain hiking and people watching

I have finally gone hiking again, and I'm finding this is a hobby I quite enjoy.

However, the only place I have gone hiking (the two times I have gone) is in Rocky Mountain National Park, so my enjoyment is based on very singular experiences. But I will say Rocky Mountain is one of the best places to hike that I can even think of. Its beauty is unlike any other. This time around we chose a trail that allowed us to see five lakes and had great mountain views.

Jack and I left Denver around 5:45 in the morning on Saturday, determined to make it to the park before 8 a.m. as our timed entry pass was for 6 to 8 a.m. We made it about 7:30 and found the trailhead parking lot we were hoping for was already full, meaning we had to park early and take the shuttle to the popular trailhead.

Our shuttle going up was packed full and we all got off in a swarm. Jack and I did not dally and gawk but went straight for the trail, beating most of the crowd at our brisk walking pace.

jumping-off point to discuss grain bin safety.

Waseca County Sheriff Jay Dulas, members of the Janesville fire department, and Waseca Ambulance emergency medical technicians showed students the inside of emergency vehicles and discussed life saving measures taken after serious accidents.

Representatives from Northland Farm Systems in Owatonna demonstrated proper safe operation for lawn mowers and weed eaters; children were instructed to step back so they could run their machines with safety goggles, gloves, and sturdy pants and footwear.

Debbie Roemhildt, volunteer and the day's coordinator, was a little disappointed with the rain but said, "We cannot control the weather, but it looks like the little ones are doing just fine." Roemhildt is a lifelong county resident who started out as a farm girl and then became a farm wife. "If we can prevent an accident, great. If not and an accident happens, maybe we can save a life. This is a perfect time of year to do this because the kids see the big equipment in the fields and it's on their minds."

Waseca County Sheriff's Deputy Josh Langr was sharing information about fire extinguishers, flares, road cones, life jackets, inflatable life jackets and emergency flotation devices. After he had answered questions regarding his

belt, pistol, pepper spray, and taser, one child asked, "Is your kid in scouts?" Langr replied with a smile, "I have two sons in scouts, and I have attended scout meetings in my uniform, so that's probably where you've seen me." Not far from Langr's group was Peter Hines, lineman for the Steele Waseca Electric Cooperative; next to him, young Maverick Hoy was wearing two large leather sleeves. Hines was teaching youngsters about the dangers of electricity, how to insulate and what not to do. "Live wires can look harmless," he warned, "but they are anything but."

Outside, Lilly, a smaller-than-average short-horned steer was lying in the grass; a light drizzle caused many of the few children left outside to pull up their hoods.

A representative from Summers Ridge Veterinary was sharing information about safety measures when interacting with animals; her information included some about the rabies virus and the effects it can have on animals. She told the children, "Possums cannot catch rabies." And all of the kids were amazed, one child commented, "It's like that's the possums' superpower." Many of the other kids nodded their heads in agreement. She then asked for a volunteer so she could demonstrate with her dog Penny how to act when they're around a dog they suspect has rabies. She said, "Just move real slow and back away, don't show aggression, no sudden movements, no loud noises." Penny the dog played her part very well, wagging her tail the whole time.

God's Grace and Spirit

Last month in my article I spoke of us being God's stewards. I pointed out that God is our Creator and Redeemer who has not only made us but who has put all that we have into our hands in order for us to be blessed and to bless others. In short, all that we have and all that we are belongs to God and is to be used for His purposes. Remember, we are not our own. We were bought with a price. Child's History of Waseca County

Continuing Chapter II, 1854-5: First White Settlement – Mr. A. G. Sutlief and Family – Journey from Dodge County, Wis. – Judge Green's Narrative – Judge Lost and Prepared for Death – Sutlief's Return – Big Boot Creek – Crossing the Mississippi on Ice

Lost on the Prairie

"After dinner Mr. Sutlief wanted me to go with him and look for a suitable place to cross the river. We went to the river, and, finding no desirable crossing, concluded to cross further up, near what seemed, by the appearance of the timber, to be a very considerable bend in the river, apparently some five or six miles away. It was agreed that Sutlief should go back and guide the teams, while I should cross the river and travel up to the proposed crossing.

Without thinking much about the company, I went slowly on until I came to the place where Dr. Kenyon afterwards lived. I could see or hear nothing of Sutlief or the company, not even a cow-bell, several of which I knew were in use on the cattle and sheep. I tried as well as I could to find their whereabouts. Although but a short distance below the proposed crossing, I could not find any trace of them before it was dark. As fate would have it, I had neither coat nor blanket, jack-knife nor matches, ax nor hatchet.

Tired out and hungry, I laid myself under a tree to rest, and was very soon asleep. With no breakfast, I renewed my search for the company, going on up the river to a point where a Mr. Bennett afterwards settled, but found no signs. I then concluded to follow down the river as long as my strength should last, unless I found something more desirable. Before proceeding, however, I pulled off a boot and, with a pin, wrote upon a smooth part of the boot-leg my name, thus: 'G.W. Gree, Beaver Dam, Wis.' not knowing but that some one would find my bones and boots, and thereby my friends might hear from me. I had a little matter of \$700 in my pockets, which, in case I should be lost, this act might be the means of my family getting. I had no other way of writing. After this preparation for the worst that might befall me, I started down the river, traveling slowly until nearly sun-down, when I found the trail where the company had crossed the river, not over half a mile where I had left Sutlief. With new courage and zeal I started on this trail. I followed it a short distance without any trouble, but, darkness coming on, the trail became invisible and I lost it. In hunting for it I stumbled and fell, and my weariness and exhaustion were such that I did not feel disposed to rise. I unconsciously fell asleep.

When I awoke the sun was high up and shining brightly. Reinvigorated by my sound and restful sleep, I soon found the trail, and, following it slowly a short time, I observed two men approaching me. They were of

our company. Looking up towards the timber, about three miles from where they had crossed the river, I saw the wagons and the remainder of the company. They had camped there early in the afternoon of the day I was lost, expecting I would see and come to them. When night came and I did not appear, they built a large fire and kept it going all night, hoping thereby to attract my attention. The next day they spent on horseback looking for me without avail.

When I arrived in camp, they represented to me that my eyes were staring, and my lips and tongue swollen. Mrs. Sutlief prepared me something to eat, but I had no appetite and could eat nothing of it, instead thereof calling for a cup of sour milk which I drank with relish. I took but very little nourishment except sour milk the rest of that day. My appetite slowly returning, the next day I ate sparingly, but it was some three or four days before I could partake of an ordinary meal."

The registration fee is \$30 per person and includes a t-shirt and race entry. Registration can be done online or by scanning the QR code and is due by Sept. 26.

NRHEG physical education teacher and coach Wendy Schultz explains fundraising events have been underway for the past two years.

“Through donations, fundraisers, and grants we have been able to raise \$84,000 and complete the first phase,” she said.

The first phase included purchasing and installing all pieces of equipment, except one. The second phase will be purchasing the last piece of equipment called the Sway Fun Glider. There is ample room for two wheelchairs plus two large benches for plenty of other passengers. Schultz said the cost to purchase and install it is about \$43,000 with about \$31,000 already raised.

Once phase two is complete, phase three will begin, which will be putting either turf or poured-in-place (PIP) rubber. The cost of phase three is approximately \$84,000 for turf and \$112,000 for PIP.

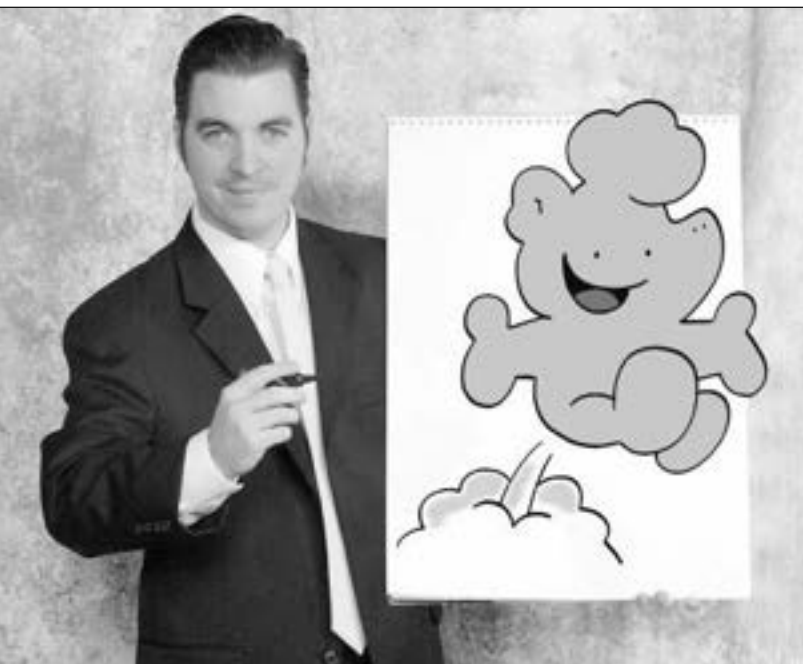

ZED (and his cartoonist Duane Abel) celebrate 30 years

Cartoonist Duane Abel and his comic strip ZED, are celebrating their 30th anniversary together. ZED first appeared in Duane’s hometown newspaper, The Free Press Standard located in Carrollton, OH, the first week of September in 1995. One month later Duane signed a contract with a small newspaper syndicate, offering ZED to newspapers nationwide and making him the youngest syndicated cartoonist ever at the age of fifteen. The syndicate went out of business before placing the comic strip in any further newspapers but Duane was too busy being a high school student to notice such adversity. Following Duane’s high school graduation he went to his mailbox to find a letter offering him a full tuition theatrical scholarship to The University of Akron and a book contract from Plan Nine Publishing. As a testament to the family work ethic, Duane still found himself on the back of his grandfather’s hay wagon that afternoon. While attending college and appearing in several stage productions and donning the costume of The University of Akron’s mascot, Zippy the Kangaroo, Duane still created ZED for weekly publication. ZED’s first book was released in the spring of 2000 with a forward by PICKLES creator Brian Crane. Before ZED’s second book could be released, Plan Nine Publishing dissolved. This led Duane to form Corkey Comics Publishing in 2005, and ZED has been available in book form ever since, receiving an Ignatz Award nomination the following year. ZED currently appears in nearly 75 weekly newspapers nationwide and has been published in several book collections. With thousands of books sold, Duane has personally autographed every single copy. An original ZED comic strip which honored the 100th birthday of PEANUTS creator Charles M. Schulz is housed inside of The Charles M. Schulz Museum.

Duane and ZED have traveled to over 1,700 schools nationwide presenting the student assembly “DRAW YOUR DESTINY” promoting goal setting, literacy and power of education. The assembly is presented with a large easel and a pad of paper, utilizing zero technology, a technique Duane learned from famed author Dav Pilkey when the DOG-MAN creator appeared at Duane’s school when Dav was still in college at Kent State University! In addition to ZED’s comic strip, Duane’s cartoons have appeared in several leading publications including Woman’s World Magazine. He is the author of

several stage plays available for performances worldwide from Silver Birchington Plays, based out of London, England. Duane’s children’s book “BOWLERS: The Cereal Mascot” drew rave reviews from BIG NATE creator Lincoln Peirce, who wrote “Bowlers is full of heart and brimming with charm.”

As an actor Duane has appeared in several feature films including the romantic comedy feature film HEARTLAND HARMONY, which he also wrote and co-produced, and can be enjoyed on Amazon and Tubi. Duane’s latest screenplay A CHRISTMAS DRAWN TOGETHER, will begin production this January in time for a holiday 2026 release.

Duane is a proud member of The National Cartoonist Society and has been inducted into Carrollton High School’s Alumni Hall of Fame in 2023. This April, Duane was honored with the The University of Akron’s Distinguished Alumni Award. He is the proud father to two boys, Zack and Clayton, and has been married to his college sweetheart Coral for over twenty years.

ZED is created from the same drawing board Duane has had since he was a child, and with the goal to draw the comic strip for at least 85 years (making Duane 100 when that feat is achieved) they have many more years of laughs and smiles ahead!

nancially by working very hard and saving his money during the summer and then “living on practically nothing” for the months college was in session. Despite its benefits, though, Bruce admits to having broken the pattern during the summer prior to his junior year. “I bought a car,” he shares. “A used car, but a nice one.”

When he found himself without finances after the first quarter of his junior year, he turned to the idea of joining the Air Force and being eligible for the G.I. Bill—a program which helps cover the cost of post-secondary schooling for veterans. After basic training at Parks Air Force Base in Calif., he was sent to Francis E. Warren Air Force Base at Cheyenne, Wyoming. Today, the most visible tasks there are associated with missiles, but Bruce’s training there centered around warehouse supply; the receiving, storing and shipping of supplies.

Bruce and Lorraine decided the “right” time had arrived; they scheduled their October wedding back home in Le Center; Lorraine left her job at Green Giant. During a quick visit to Cheyenne they were able to find an apartment and make arrangements to move in after the wedding.

“We call that our eight-month honeymoon!” Bruce remembers. His training and work at the air force base went so well he was offered a position as an instructor - which seemed to mean he would be stationed there for his entire time in the service. It took Lorraine only days to find a job in Cheyenne.

For the next several months, things seemed to have fallen smoothly into place - until Bruce and the other instructors were surprised by orders sending them to France. With the “honeymoon” suddenly ending, Lorraine moved back to Le Center.

When Bruce returned 16 months later, he had one year remaining in the service. Offered a choice between Wisconsin and Duluth, he chose Duluth. He and Lorraine purchased a trailer house. “It was less than 40 feet long,” Bruce describes, “and if I stood in the center, I could almost stretch out my arms and reach both sides.” It suited their needs and their budget, though, and was destined to provide their dwelling place for about three years.

When Bruce’s military service was completed in 1958, the couple moved back to Mankato. Bruce changed his major to teaching - he says his experience as an instructor in the military had been positive, and had given him what turned out to be some unrealistic ideas about student motivation. However, he wouldn’t learn that until 1960.

In the meantime, the couple brought their first child, Patty, into the world. She was born in Mankato in 1960. Society’s expectations being what they were, Lorraine would not return to professional employment for about the next 16 years.

That fall, Bruce was offered a position as a social studies teacher in Minneota, a small town northwest of Marshall. When they decided to rent a house there, the plan was to sell the trailer and use the money to buy furniture. Instead, the store owner offered a trade: a certain value of furniture in exchange for the trailer. To this day, the couple owns and uses a few of those pieces. The two say their time in Minneota was marred by being 130 miles from home, and in a small town with limited local offerings. Their family had also grown with the addition of their son Bob, who was born in Marshall in 1961. “If I had known how well they were going to turn out,” jests Bruce regarding their children. “I might have gone for three or four. But we stopped at the two of them.”

So when Bruce learned of a teaching position in Waseca, only 35 miles from Le Center, the family relocated. They rented their dwelling for a while, but within five years had the good fortune to purchase a house only two blocks from Central High School in one direction, and two blocks from their church in another. “And that was our home for the next 38 years,” summarized Bruce, who



continued as a member of the Waseca district’s high school social studies department until retiring in the spring of 1993.

When their children were teenagers, Lorraine returned to the professional world, finding that typewriters had been replaced by computers. She says she joined the staff of Waseca Mutual Insurance Company just as the company began the process of transferring its paper records to computer files. She apparently learned quickly, since she went on to serve as a department manager working with data entry and retrieval for more than 20 years before she also retired in 1994.

The two eventually sold their first home so that they could purchase a different one with fewer levels.

After retirement, Lorraine describes taking some pleasant trips together. They bought a used motor home for the purpose of driving to Alaska. They spent a month sightseeing there, as well as the drive up and back. They also later joined a tour to Nova Scotia. While doing genealogy they took a long trip to visit family across a wide area of the United States. These days, Lorraine says, they’re content to live a quiet life, with their weekly gathering for coffee with some friends and fellow re-

tired teachers. They also attend church when they can. Visits with their children and grandchildren are always looked forward to. The couple has two grandchildren, Ross and Emily, ages 29 and 30, and one great-grandchild with another on the way.

Of Bruce, Lorraine says, “Bruce continues to impress me with his long term memory. He can recall things from a long time ago that I have forgotten.”

Bruce says he still has a soft heart for his childhood sweetheart, naming one of her strengths: “She has amazing thoughtfulness and caring about others. She always puts others first.”

Their long life together means they have celebrated their shared birthday, “oh, in so many different ways,” comments Lorraine with a smile, seeming to hint she does not plan to look for any more special tweaks for their party in September.

“Living to 91,” comments Bruce philosophically, “doesn’t seem to be such a big deal anymore. Thanks to modern medicine, many people live to that age. “But being married for 70 years, that’s a bit more of an accomplishment.” We’re both still alive and in reasonably good health. Our lives are so intertwined, it’s almost as if we’ve lived one shared life.”

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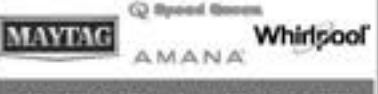

Education is integral in the "learn by doing" philosophy of 4-H. As part of the educational component, Minnesota 4-H requires every youth participating in the livestock encampment to participate in a livestock interview. Examples of the interview process include an online knowledge test, skill-a-thons, and per-

sonal interviews about their project area. Youth from Waseca County who were recognized for their knowledge with interview callbacks included:

Along with interviews, all 4-H youth participating in livestock programming are required to complete the Livestock Quality Assurance and Ethics (LQA&E) Training. Through this certification, youth are educated on biosecurity, educating the public on the role of livestock, and caring for their animal's welfare.

Quality animals, quality kids, and quality buyers made the 46th 4-H Purple Ribbon Auction, the annual parade of champion beef, lambs, goats, swine and poultry set 8 new record prices. This year the 4-H Purple Ribbon Auction went over \$1,300,000 in additional premium dollars from 115 head for Minnesota 4-H youth and Animal Science programs. A huge thank you for all of the sponsors throughout the whole state in support of the exhibitors. The Minnesota 4-H Purple Ribbon Auction is sponsored by the Minnesota Livestock Breeders Association each year. Ty Krautkremer of the Homegrown Explorers 4-H Club with his Reserve Champion Market Doe was selected to participate in the 4-H Purple Ribbon Auction. Additionally, Hannah Sommers of the Riverside Ramblers 4-H Club with her purple ribbon market lamb was also selected to participate in the 4-H Purple Ribbon Auction. 4-H not only produces purple ribbon animals, but more importantly is focused on producing purple ribbon kids.

4-H youth from across Minnesota again showcased their learning in the 4-H Building at the Minnesota State Fair. Over 160 demonstrations were delivered and over 1,900 general exhibits were on display. In a continuation of the virtual state showcase format developed in 2020, over 110 of the general exhibits were judged virtually this year.

Throughout the year, 4-H youth select project areas that reflect personal areas of interest and pursue hands-on learning in both self-directed and guided environments. The results of their learning are exhibited at county fairs and other showcase events across the state. A collection of the best exhibits from each fair and showcase are brought to presentations in the 4-H Building at the Minnesota State Fair.

Exhibiting project work and delivering public presentations at the state fair provides youth an opportunity to showcase their achievements and continue learning through interactive conference judging with project experts and team experiences.
