Bus Driver Appreciation Day Feb. 18

February 18 is Minnesota "Bus Driver Appreciation Day."

For the father and daughter pair of Barry Olson and Nicole Bowman, becoming a school bus driver was not a career they would have chosen. Now, though, it's one they wouldn't want to give up.

The two are employed by Palour Bus Service and drive routes for the Janesville-Walworth-Pemberton

school district. Nicole has gone so far as to become the service's site manager for JWP.

Barry began about 30 years ago when former site manager Tim Engel learned of his retirement from an Oronoco job of 41 years and suggested he might use his open time to drive a van route, which does not require a commercial driver's license (CDL).

Though he had to be asked twice, Barry gave the job a try and was soon

taking the six-week training needed to earn a CDL and drive the bigger vehicles.

Three days he's among the minority of JWP drivers who don't mind driving in the Twin Cities metro area. "Sometimes construction, or some other factor can throw a wrench in things," he admits. "But you always find your way out of it sooner or later."

Closer to home, however, the two say only a mail delivery worker

knows the roads and residences of the area better than a typical bus driver.

Nicole decided to give the job a try in 2020. She stepped right into the big shoes, taking the permit test, doing the practice driving, and then testing on the road. She notes her road test was in the flat-faced bus, a vehicle which has certain eccentricities because the driver is actually sitting

Broadband hookups to begin March 1

An update presented during the Feb. 5 county board meeting revealed that homeowners will begin being connected to the newly laid internet fiber optic cable network in the southern part of the county beginning March 1. It is anticipated about eight connections will take place each day, weather permitting, with a total of more than 400 connections to be made.

A listing of services and prices offered by internet provider Incomm is available at incomm.net.

Information was also shared regarding what can be done for people who are relatively near the installation area, but not within it.

Steve Kosa, who served as an advisory capacity at Waseca County applied for and eventually received about \$7.5 million in grants through the state office of broadband development, summarized the "broadband line extension program" offered by the same department. He explained individuals can apply to have an extension laid to networks within one or two miles of their location. For those whose application is selected, the office of broadband development will cover the cost of the extension up to \$25,000.

Conversation during the summary suggested that property owners are more likely to receive the extension if a cluster of applications in an area makes it more financially practical to extend the line. Anyone interested in learning more about the line extension program can visit the state office of broadband development website at <http://mn.gov/broadband/development>. The line extension application is also available on the county website.

Mike Filzen Poker Run, rain or shine, snow or no

The twelfth annual Mike Filzen Memorial Poker Run took place during the afternoon of Saturday, Feb. 7 starting at the Waseca American Legion Hall. Signup started at 11:30 a.m. with a noon departure; the Legion also hosted the 7 p.m. return. Winners for the event were Brooke in first place for \$100, she did not give her last name. Barb Ahlman in second for \$75 and Jake in third place for \$50. The goal of a \$500 Scholarship was reached for one lucky student in Waseca County and participants raised \$310 for cancer research.

In a “poker run,” the object is one solid hand of poker, a single game that lasts all day. The destination is five bars in five different towns, each saloon equipped with a board that has a full deck of cards spread out on it like a giant dart board. At each stop every player gets to throw a single dart at the board with the start being the board in the legion. Wherever the dart lands is the card they are dealt with five cards total. There is one exception, “If you hit a card you already have, throw again.”

Seth Langager, one of the members of the snowmobile club said, “We’re doing this run for Mike and to aid in the schol-

arship at the school. Mike died of pancreatic cancer; all proceeds from today’s run go towards cancer research.” The treasurer of the club was also there, Jake Sopkowiak, “I got here at 11:20 a.m., we’ll know how much we raised by tonight. This is a pretty good year, there might actually be more people here this year than last year. We used to have way more people when this was a snowmobile event, but with the weather the past few years we’re sort of getting shortchanged on the powder lately. But doing this with snowmobiles was our original intent.”

Chad Bjerke was nearby, helping with the signup and he said, “I am just a guy who knew Mike, I was friends with him for a lot of years. It is our twelfth year doing this, but full disclosure, we did have to take a year off when covid hit, but that wasn’t by choice. It would be better with snowmobiles but if cars are our only option, so be it.”

The poker players started off their mission at the Waseca Legion followed by the Willows in New Richland, Papa Ollie’s out of Waldorf, the Thirsty Beaver in Elysian, and finally the Classics Pub in Waterville before heading back to the Waseca Legion with a full poker hand to regroup and mellow for a while. Judging and drinks to follow.

Waldorf considering power generator

During their meeting the evening of Monday, Feb. 9, members of the Waldorf city council discussed the possibility of purchasing a generator to supply power to city hall when other sources of electricity become unavailable. On Jan. 21, power was out for the town of Waldorf for about four hours; during that time, the city fire department could not leave the building because the electric door wouldn’t open. That, and since city hall is the emergency management center for the town, prompted the city council’s interest.

Council members learned the eagle statue for the Veterans’ Memorial has not arrived yet. There are \$100 engraved bricks available for the Veterans’ Memorial walkway. Those interested can contact Charles Barnes (763) 286-2246 charles.barnes@barneccat.com.

Council members passed a resolution signing the city of Waldorf on to the Waseca County All-Hazard Mitigation plan, a step needed to be eligible for any Federal Emergency Management Agency reimbursement.

City maintenance inspected three trees within city limits which were regarded as being potentially hazardous. Only one was determined to be a nuisance and will be taken care of. Dan McGanon’s dead tree was most likely due to construction and does not need to be removed.

Sheriff Dulas requested a map to properly address security during the Waldorf Days musical performance; Waldorf Days will be August 21 to 23 this year. One council member suggested asking for the Sheriff’s posse, which would also help with underage consumption policing and crowd control.

Council members learned the city will now be paying 72.5 cents per mile to those who have approval to use their private vehicles for city business. The rate is 2.5 cents more than last year, and is based on the recently increased Internal Revenue Service federal reimbursement rate.

The next Park Committee meeting will take place on Thursday, Feb. 19, at 6:30 at the Waldorf community center, everyone is encouraged to join.

Ron Fischer from maintenance reported, “Everything’s been cleaned up” regarding the creamery. He also fixed some loose bolts on some playground equipment council member Missy Sorbo had pointed out.

The water and sewer summary stated nearly \$2,300 in water bills for city residents remained unpaid.

‘Ask a Trooper’: Turning and Lane Changes

Question: I took my driver's training course many years ago. One thing I remember from my training is the steps that goes into making a right-hand turn, including:

1. Looking to my right to make sure no one/nothing is there.
2. Putting on my right turn signal.
3. Looking again for no obstacles.
4. Proceeding to move over to the curb to allow forward-moving traffic (behind me) to not be disrupted by my right-hand turn.

In my nearly 12 years back in the community, I could very easily count on both hands the number of people that have followed this method for making a right turn. Very few drivers, if any, move over to the right when making their turn, let alone use their signals. Can you provide clarification on this?

Answer: A traffic lane is a part of the street or highway wide enough for a vehicle or line of vehicles to drive safely. You are in a traffic lane whenever you drive on any street or highway. Lanes may not always be marked, but they exist whether marked or not. You must stay within a single traffic lane without weaving or straddling the lane markings. If it is a solid white line, you should not cross over it. Some areas have marked turning lanes.

Many highways and streets have pavement markings. White lines separate lanes of traffic traveling in the same direction.

- White dashes: You can change lanes where this marking is present.
- Shorter and thicker white dashes: The lane is ending.
- Solid white line: You should not change lanes. Solid white lines also mark crosswalks, stop lines
- at intersections, parking stalls and the edges of a roadway.
- Double solid white lines: You must not change lanes.
- Solid white line with bicycle insignia: This area is for bicycle

or electric-assist bicycle traffic only.

- If you are on a bicycle, you must travel in the same direction as adjacent traffic

You often need to change lanes to turn, merge with traffic or do other driving activities. Changing lanes can be dangerous and must be done carefully. To stay safe, make sure you have space to the side behind and ahead of your vehicle before moving into another lane. Turn your head to check the lane you are moving into for vehicles. Don't rely solely on mirrors; you may miss vehicles in your blind spots.

Drivers who turn improperly cause many traffic crashes. Move safely into the correct lane well ahead of the place where you will make the actual turn.

- Slow down before turning. Signal your intent at least 100 feet before the turn. Signals let pedestrians and drivers know what you plan to do.

- While waiting to turn, keep your wheels straight and your foot on the brake. If your vehicle is struck from behind, you are less likely to be pushed into oncoming traffic.

- Continue signaling until you begin your turn.

- Do not make sudden turns from the wrong lane.

- Watch for traffic or obstacles in the road you plan to enter.

- Always finish your turn in the correct lane.

- If the car ahead of you is signaling for a left turn, slow down and prepare to stop.

You can avoid a ticket - and a crash - if you simply buckle up, drive at safe speeds, pay attention, and always plan ahead for a sober ride. Help us drive Minnesota Toward Zero Deaths.

Layla Keith sets school record as Waseca gymnastics defeats St. Peter

Layla Keith set a new school record on the floor exercise and led the Waseca Bluejays to a 132.225–123.600 victory over St. Peter on Tuesday night at the Waseca Intermediate School.

Waseca controlled the meet with balanced scoring across all four events, posting team totals of 35.15 on vault, 30.05 on bars, 31.175 on beam and a meet-best 35.85 on floor. St. Peter finished with scores of 33.4 on vault, 26.275 on bars, 31.675 on beam and 32.25 on floor.

Keith captured the all-around title with a score of 34.875. Teammate Hannah Parks placed third with a 32.775, while Ellie Clark finished fourth overall with a 32.525, giving the Bluejays three of the top four all-around finishers.

On the vault, Keith paced Waseca with a first-place score of 9.05. Clark followed in second with an 8.825, and Katelyn Weber added a third-place finish with an 8.7.

Keith also claimed first place on the uneven bars with an 8.425. Weber finished third with a 7.25, and Parks placed fourth at 7.225.

Parks led the Bluejays on the balance beam, earning an 8.275 to top Waseca's performers in the event. Keith added a fourth-place finish with a 7.8.

The highlight of the meet came on the floor exercise, where Keith delivered a record-setting routine. Her score of 9.6 established a new school record and marked a new personal best, earning her first place in the event. Parks followed with a strong



9.0, and Clark recorded a personal-best 8.95 to place fourth.

The Bluejays will return to action on Thursday, February 5, when they

host Blue Earth Area at the Waseca Intermediate School. The meet is scheduled to begin at 6 p.m.

County listening session addresses hunting change

A group of about 50 hunting enthusiasts shared their input regarding a change in Minnesota deer hunting regulations for the 2026 season during a “listening session” with county commissioners the evening of Feb. 5.

During the 2025 legislative session, an 84-year-old rule restricting deer hunters to using only shotguns in the southern half of the state was overridden. The law now allows “all legal shotguns and rifles” to be used anywhere in the state—unless an individual county chooses to retain the shotgun-only restriction.

At the time the session was scheduled, commissioners had been told their decision was needed by March 1 if they wanted the county's status listed in state publications summarizing deer hunting regulations for the 2026 deer season. The Department of Natural Resources (DNR) had let it be known its officers would only be enforcing regulations included in that publication.

Only shortly before the Feb. 5 meeting, the DNR extended that

deadline to May 5.

An introductory slide show produced by county administrator Michael Johnson summarized an array of information regarding the long-standing regulation. Although many interpreted the shotgun-only practice to be related to safety because of the firearm's shorter range, the DNR has released statements that it was related only to “herd management”—that because shotguns are somewhat less accurate, restricting hunting to their use would reduce the number of deer harvested. The DNR has stated it has no objection to the change, since deer populations across the state have reached levels which no longer require protection.

Johnson shared that the DNR did not initiate the new regulations, but that numerous lobbying organizations had approached legislators asking for the change. The DNR, he said, has taken a “neutral stance” when counties have asked for input regarding their local regulations. The

department has requested, though, that counties provide “all or nothing” decisions—either the statewide standard or shotgun only—without any locally selected specifications.

Commissioners pointed out during the meeting that if they issue no local regulation, the county will automatically fall under the statewide rule, and thus “no decision is also a decision.”

During some introductory statements, board chair De Malterer told those in attendance, “We are here tonight to listen and to learn. We know there are many thoughts and feelings surrounding this issue, so we are here to listen to what you have to say.”

Thirteen people shared statements during the one-hour session: all but two indicated support for allowing rifles.

Tony Hanson of Waseca suggested that allowing rifles would be helpful when introducing young hunters to the sport, and in encouraging older hunters to continue since rifles do not have kickback and are not as loud as shotguns. Chad Groskreutz of Vivian Township commented he is in agreement with a change that will encour-

age youth.

A number of speakers observed that the deer population is apparently rising, leading to more vehicle accidents involving the animals and to related economic costs including repairs and insurance, so harvesting more animals would be beneficial.

One speaker seemed reassured that the statewide law continues to allow shotguns for those who prefer them. Another mentioned that, from the perspective of hunting as a sport, he prefers the extra challenges imposed by shotguns. In referring to the longer range offered by rifles, he stated those hunting on open fields can “sit in a deer stand and have a clear line of sight to any deer within 100 acres.”

Comments from board chair Malterer had made it clear no decision would be made during the meeting, and that “any decision is not based only on information from constituents.” She said the board would continue receiving information from numerous sources and work toward making its decision before the newly announced May 5 deadline.

ting a few feet in front of the front axle.

Each school day, JWP drivers pick up nearly 350 children—about half the district's students—across a wide area which Nicole describes as spanning from Waterville to Minnesota Lake. As site manager, Nicole arrives at 5:30. Other drivers are not far behind; they give their respective vehicles a pre-trip safety check and then head out on one of seven routes. From the time they arrive to the time they return their again-empty buses to the garage is about two hours.

However Barry and Nicole seem to feel the job of bus driver is not one to be measured in hours, but rather in connections and accomplishments.

“We're like an aunt or an uncle,” says Nicole in an attempt to describe it. “The kids know us, they trust us, they rely on us. They know we'll be there and we'll get them where they need to go.

“We're the first and the last non-family person our kids see each day, and in some cases we spend more than an hour together.”

With a decade of driving behind him, Barry observes, “It's a lot of fun watching the kids grow up.” He mentions the difference between a shy or nervous kindergartener and the same child a few years later. “And then

there are the younger brothers and sisters,” he mentions. “Over time, we get to be there to see a whole family of kids as they move across the grades.”

Nicole mentions that, as site manager, it is her job to arrange the bus routes. As families arrive in the district and as children reach school age, decisions have to be made regarding which route will be adjusted to pick up new passengers. The decision takes much more into account than most people might realize.

“Of course there's the location of the home and what routes go nearby,” Nicole begins. “But then there's the age of the child.” An important factor is the direction the bus will be facing as it arrives—whether the child will have to cross the street or will be able to step directly into the bus.

“Especially if it's a busy street,” she explains, “we don't want a small child having to walk across it.”

The nature of a bus driver's duties automatically make it a part-time job, with many typical route drivers working four hours each day. Many get additional driving hours by taking on field trips or transporting groups to various competitions and events. Once at the destination, bus drivers often get free admission.

Barry describes a set of tours designed by a JWP history teacher who has taken students to various locations in the region which relate to the subjects they are studying. Since he was present for much of the dialogue, Barry says the tours—which have in-

cluded the First Nation History Center at Morton, the “Little House on the Prairie” area around Walnut Grove, and sites significant to the Jesse James manhunt around Northfield—have been enjoyable and informative.

“You just never know what this job will bring you,” he says of each day. It also helps build certain habits, the two drivers relate.

“It's gotten so I evaluate a vehicle automatically,” says Barry of the pre-trip safety checks. “Pretty much any car I walk by, I'm sort of subconsciously checking to see if the tires are properly inflated or if there's anything hanging under the carriage.” He laughs as he tells he must sometimes remind himself NOT to stop at railroad tracks and open the doors when he's driving his own vehicle.

Nicole acknowledges that the part-time nature of the job and the 40-foot length of a school bus are probably big factors in an ongoing shortage of bus drivers. She tells of individuals who have begun the training process

by studying the procedures and rules, but gotten behind the wheel of a bus for their first practices and stated, “It's just too big.” Others, though, have declared happily, “This is easy!”

Both she and Barry acknowledge there are elements of driving buses which can be intimidating.

“It maybe takes a certain mindset,” Nicole says. “You have to be flexible. You have to be ready for a challenge or two.

“But it's also a lot of fun, and most of the ‘surprises’ are good ones.”

She describes being out in public, hearing her name called, and having some of her daily passengers run up to her and give her a hug. Barry tells of families and children who make certain he is acknowledged for holidays like Christmas and Valentines' Day.

“Being a bus driver is being a part of each kid's education,” observes Barry. “It also means you're part of their life. They may not always pay that much attention to you, but they know you're there.”

Keep the fire burning

The fire crackled, burning bright. I could feel the heat from where I was sitting. It was a crisp night—a perfect night for a fire. The family was roasting marshmallows, laughing as they tried to shove the whole s'more into their mouth. Half of the gooey marshmallow stuck to my son's cheek.

I love campfires. I can sit there and watch for hours and not be bored. And as I sat there this time, without even realizing it, after some time, the heat had dwindled. It was still hot, but not as it was. Then more time passed and there was more white than there were the bright reds, yellows, and oranges.

I know what will happen if I don't throw another log on. So, I did. And within minutes, the fire was hot and bright once again. As I sat there again, I thought of passion.

Passion. Now that's a word. When you hear the word, "passion", what comes to your mind?

Perhaps that word elicits a romantic thought for you. Or maybe a fiery person. Or one who stands up proudly for their cause. Whatever you think about, passion is necessary to avoid the lethargy, the complacency, the apathy of this life.

You and I weren't meant to live a life of complacency; we were meant for passion. So, what is passion? How do we find it? How does passion combat complacency?

First, passion is more than just excitement. Perhaps that's a modern-day synonym.

Someone might say, "He was passionate about that team." But that's not really the same.

Passion isn't just a strong emotion, fueled by likes or dislikes. Passion is a fueled desire that continues for a long time. That's right. Passion isn't a flash in a pan. It is consistent, it's a commitment. It's something you engage and don't let go. Passion is engaging what you love, enduring through the struggle and the pain, and staying committed to it.

The crazy thing is you don't "find" passion. I know we use that phrase. "You have to find your passion." But it's really not the truth. Rather, passion is forged. It's developed over time, by both positive and negative experiences. I know, crazy. Passion is actually formed through the good and the bad. Passion without the problems is actually a mirage. It's not really passion. We need the hard things of life, the uphill climbs, the difficulties and the desert seasons to shape who we are. In order to truly have a passion for something, we have to see the value in it. If something doesn't have value, we do very little to pursue it.

Think about that for a moment. Let's take Jesus' parables in Luke 15 for an example. The shepherd has 100 sheep, and 1 goes astray. What led the shepherd to leave the 99 to find the 1? Passion! A love for his sheep and a desire for no sheep to be lost. The woman has 10 coins, and one gets lost. What led the woman to search diligently to find the 1? Passion!

That coin had both monetary and intrinsic value, and she had passion that led her to search high and low for that coin. The father had 2 sons, and 1 goes prodigal. What led that father to search the countryside for his son? Passion! That son, made in the image of God, was lost and the father's love for his son was greater than the sin the son committed.

In His greatest sermon, Jesus said, "Where your treasure is, there your heart will be also." Yes, Jesus was referring to money, but I believe He was teaching us wherever we invest anything, will ultimately impact our attentions and our affections—our mind and our heart.

The opposite of passion is complacency. Complacency is really just emotional and spiritual auto-pilot. Now, when you're cruising at 30,000 feet on a trip from MSP to, pick any city in the world, auto-pilot is great. The pilot can sit back, relax, talk to the cabin, read a book, even. Completely acceptable (the book, maybe not). Complacency causes that passion, that fire burning in you to cool, to fail to produce the result it once did. Auto-pilot.

Comfortable complacency is the bitter enemy of passionate love for Jesus. It's like sitting at the fire, just staring, wondering what changed. The truth is...you did. Not because you actively rebelled against God, but because you simply neglected stoking the fire.

So, we said we don't really find passion, we form it. So how do we "stoke the fire"? How do we forge the passion for God? We ask ourselves deep, important, and formative questions.

And we ask other people these same questions and we invite them to ask us. Here are some questions to get us moving: What am I feeding most? What am I thinking about most?

What am I investing in most? What am I pursuing most? Where am I spending the most time, money, energy, and attention? Be careful as you answer them, for passion follows these answers most closely.

So, with the little space I have left, how do we return to our first and highest passion—our love for God and our neighbors? First, engage in your relationship with God daily. Even one day is enough time for our passion to cool. Spend time with Him, pray, read His Word, study it, memorize it. Passion longs for daily presence, while complacency is satisfied with memory. Stay connected with Christ. Second, engage in your relationship with others regularly. You need spiritual community to keep the fire going. If you don't, you will cool very quickly. Third, point out areas in your life that you are neglecting, that are distracting, or that have become too busy. Confess that those things that are causing complacency and then return to our Father who has been searching for you.

And when you do these things, it's like throwing a log on the fire of your soul. That's how you keep the fire burning.

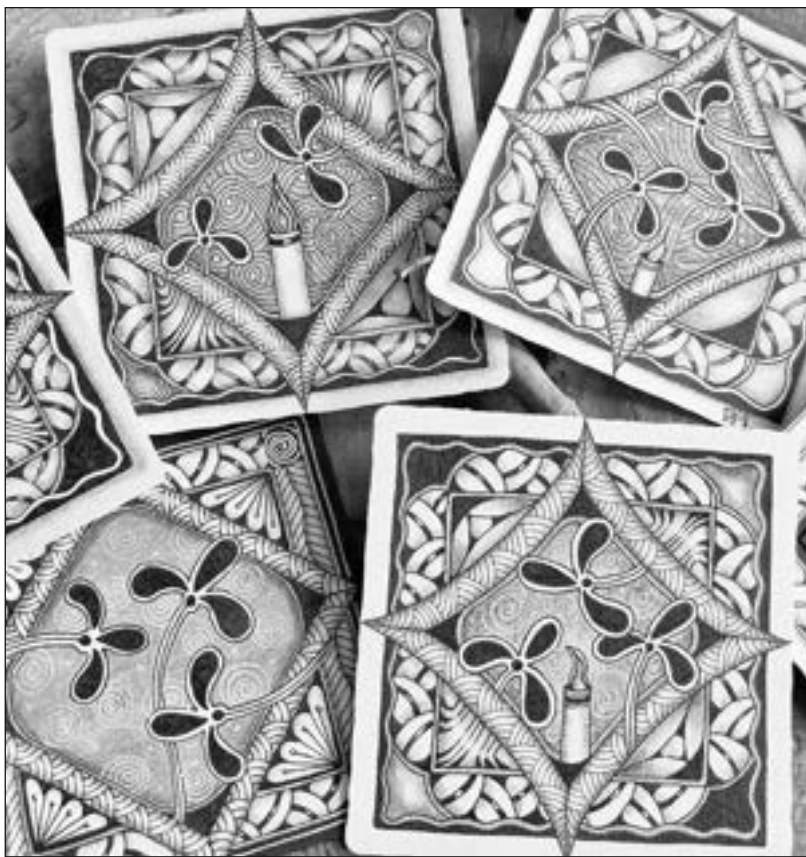

Jasinski newsletter: New security procedures

Dear Friends and Neighbors,

The 2026 legislative session starts next week, on Tuesday, Feb. 17. In advance of the session, I wanted to make you aware of some important security changes as you plan your Day on the Hill or visit to the State Capitol or Minnesota Senate Building (MSB).

Starting the first day of session, additional security screenings will be required to enter the State Capitol and the MSB, as well as the Senate Viewing Gallery.

Please plan ahead and arrive at the State Capitol or MSB about 15 minutes earlier than you would have in years past to give yourself extra time to get through security screenings.

These procedures are brand new this year, and while I hope for a smooth rollout, it's best to be prepared for delays, especially when a large group or organization is visiting for a Day on the Hill.

State Capitol

On Monday, Jan. 26, Gov. Walz issued an executive order to implement weapons screening at the State Capitol. The screenings will start the first day of session. Permit to carry holders are allowed to bring their firearm into the Capitol, but to pass security, they must have their physical permit to carry card and a government-issued photo ID. If you're carrying a firearm, keep both your permit and ID with you the entire time you're at the Capitol.

Screening stations will be located at the main entrance of the Capitol (South) beneath the steps, and at underground tunnel access points. The Capitol's West and East entrances will remain locked throughout session.

If you exit the Capitol, you will be required to pass security when you re-enter.

Senate Gallery

Senate President Bobby Joe Champion (DFL-Minneapolis) issued a memo on Jan. 26 requiring the use of additional security screening for all members of the public entering the Senate Gallery. That memo also prohibits the carrying of firearms or other dangerous weapons (as defined by Minn. Stat. 609.02, subd. 6) by members of the public in the Senate Gallery, including for those who have a permit to carry. This prohibition does not apply to licensed peace officers or Senate Sergeants-at-Arms when they are performing official duties.

Members of the public carrying a firearm will be denied access to the Senate Gallery—there will be no weapons storage. In this case, you can watch Senate floor sessions on the TV monitors placed outside the Senate chambers on the second floor of the Capitol.

Minnesota Senate Building

The Minnesota Senate Building (MSB), where my office (# 2227) is located and where many Senate committee hearings take place, will also require security screening for

members of the public. Screening will be located at the main entrance of the MSB (corner of University Ave. and Cedar Ave.).

If you exit the MSB, you will be required to pass security when you re-enter.

If you're visiting both the MSB and the Capitol, you will be required to pass security when you enter each building.

Prohibited Items at the State Capitol and MSB

Weapons: firearms (unless carried by a valid permit holder), knives, explosives, blunt objects

Contraband: illegal substances, alcohol

Protest items: balloons, spray paint/chalk, tape, candles/open flames

Accessible Parking

For vehicles under 8.2 feet: 20 disability parking spots are located in the Senate Office Building for no cost. Coming from Rice Street onto Sherburne Ave., take a right onto Capitol Blvd. and then another right into the parking garage. Once parked, find and press the access button. Security will unlock the door and direct you to the screening checkpoint.

The distance from the parking elevator to the Capitol elevators is 425 feet, or approximately 3/4 of a city block. There are benches throughout the tunnel. The tunnel is open during Capitol hours.

You can find more information about public parking at the Minne-

sota Department of Administration.

A Final Note

Change is always difficult, but I'm committed to keeping the State Capitol—the People's House—as open to the public as possible, and to keeping the Minnesota Senate Building accessible so you can attend committee hearings and visit my office.

Senate Republicans didn't have a say in approving either the Governor's executive order or Senate Democrats' rule to ban firearms from the Senate gallery. However, we advocated for Second Amendment rights and voiced our concerns over Constitutional infringement as well as logistical challenges. We'll closely monitor these new procedures, provide feedback to Capitol Security, and push for changes or improvements where necessary.

Please contact Gov. Walz's office if you have feedback on the State Capitol entrance security, and Sen. Champion's office with feedback on Senate Gallery security.

I look forward to your visit this session. Please reach out to my office if you have any questions or feedback on your experience with these new procedures.

The loss dropped Waseca's season record to 3-20.

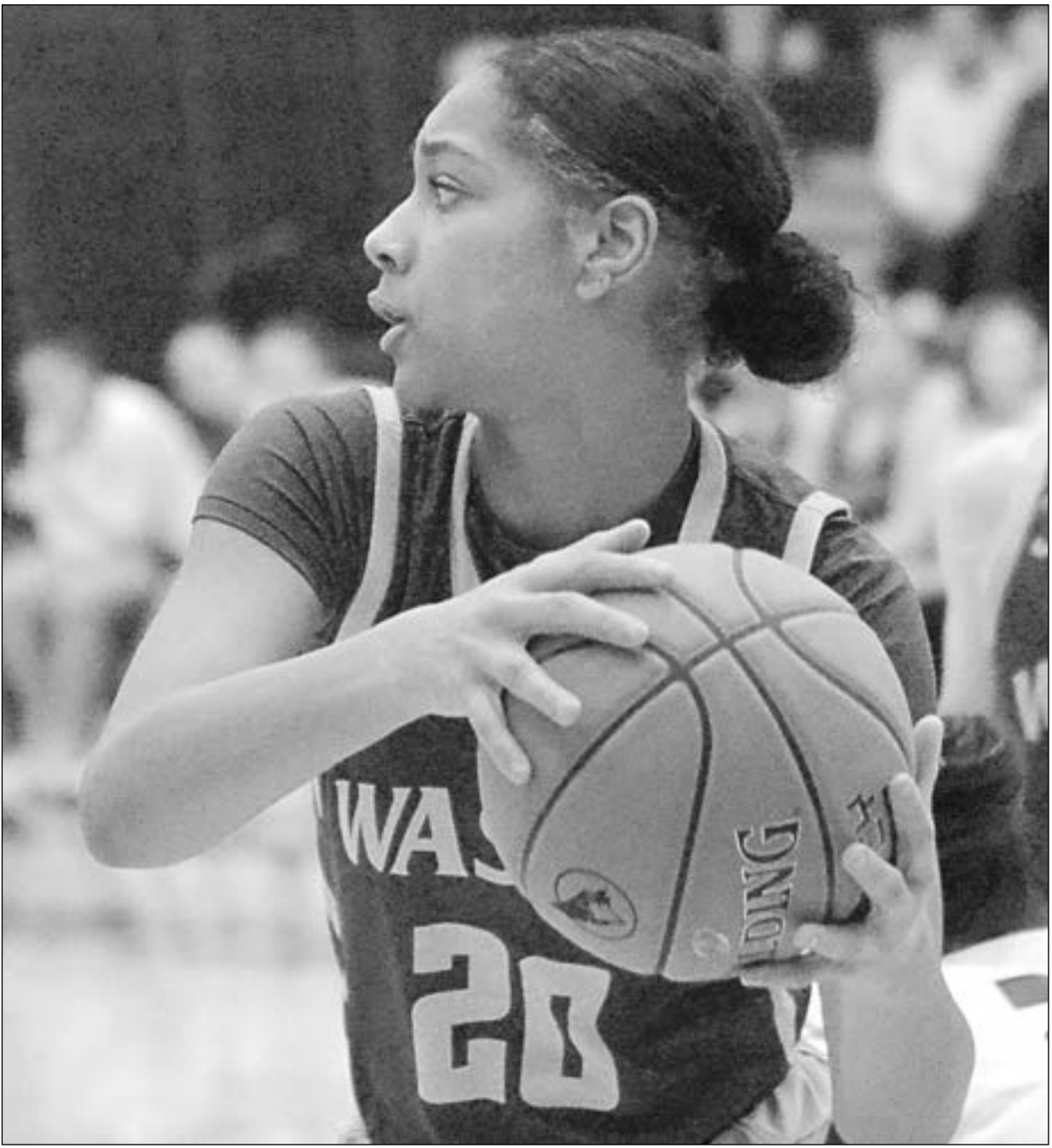
The Bluejays notched a second straight win at home Tuesday night, defeating LeSueur-Henderson 64-57 in a nonconference game to improve to 5-18 overall.

Langford makes school history for wrestling Grizzlies

The WEM/JWP Grizzly girls' wrestling team competed at the Section 2 Tournament Feb. 6-7 at the Mayo Civic Center in Rochester.

The Grizzlies sent seven athletes to the tournament, and six returned home with medals—an impressive showing that reflects the tremendous growth this team made throughout the season.

"The strides these athletes took, both individually and collectively, were remarkable, and the coaching staff could not be more proud of their progress," said Grizzlies co-head coach Adam Roesler.

The program's first-ever girls' wrestling state qualifier is Kayle Langford at 139 pounds. Entering the tournament as the No. 2 seed, Langford exceeded expectations by capturing the section championship.

"Kayle trains daily with the boys in practice, a decision she made intentionally," said Coach Roesler. "As one of the most experienced and physically strongest wrestlers in the room coming into the season, she wanted to be challenged—to be pushed beyond her comfort zone rather than staying with partners she could easily handle. That mindset is not common, but it defines who she is as a wrestler."

Her toughness has been evident for years. Two seasons ago, during a practice in Janesville, Langford hit her head on a metal window frame. When concern was raised over her now-black eye and the possibility of injury, her response was simple and direct: she insisted she was fine and demanded to get back to work. That grit, resilience, and refusal to back down in the face of adversity are exactly what make her a champion—and the kind of competitor every wrestling room respects.

After falling in the championship match, Skidmore wrestled again in the true second match for a state berth. Though she came up short, the weekend was a testament to how far she has come. By Sunday, Skidmore was already reflecting on her growth and setting her sights on next season—a mindset that often leads to future success.

While the white ribbon of third place can sting, especially when the goal feels so close, it can also become powerful motivation and a valuable life lesson.

Said Roesler, "The remaining Grizzly wrestlers were all first-year competitors, yet they still earned medals and wins at the section tournament. Their rapid learning curve and steady improvement throughout the season culminated in strong performances on the awards stand, providing an exciting glimpse into the future of the program. Congratulations to all of the WEM/JWP Grizzly girls on an outstanding season and a historic weekend for the program."

We’ve got lots of donated prizes, free hot dogs and condiments, hot chocolate, chips and assorted cookies.”

He went on to say money for the food was provided by the Minnesota Dark House and Angling Association, a statewide nonprofit organization aimed at protecting fishing heritage. After he was done speaking, Berg pulled out an ice

cream bucket filled with red raffle tickets, fished around for one and called its number. Only seconds passed before Serena Luckylewis arrived with her ticket and was handed a brand-new wearable head lamp.

Phil Bufor was standing next to Berg, another organizer of the day’s event, “We’re excited to be new to the community, our club I mean. We are looking to create awareness for the Legion; people tend to forget it’s there and take it for granted. Awareness for veterans, same as the Legion, people tend to forget. Awareness about fishing like this and seeing

how it’s done is also a great message for kids, and to get them interested.” He was asked about the day’s warm temperatures and the threat of thin ice and he replied, “We are all about safety, we had a guy out here yesterday checking ice thickness. Greener World Solutions was also out here just this morning when they drilled the holes, another great donation, we all checked and the ice is still a good and solid 6 to 8 inches thick. Too many warm days like this and we might’ve had to cancel, but for today we’re good.”
